The first term of the year has flown by! Although when I think back to the start of the term it feels like a long time ago and I am reminded that we have packed so much in!

We had our last governors meeting of the term this week and in my Head Teacher's Report to governors I listed well over thirty curriculum enhancement events, that is to say those special events which we carry out above and beyond our basic curriculum offer. I would like to thank our fabulous staff team, not just in their day to day duties, but for all that they do above and beyond to ensure that St. Mary's continues to deliver an exceptional offer to its families.



In less than a week before the governors meeting, I attended the Fair Funding for Schools meeting at Putney Community Church. As you can imagine a bleak picture was painted, but I came away feeling how lucky I was to lead a school with so much support from our families and the local community. After five years at St. Mary's, Mrs Barron relocated back to her roots in Sheffield with her gorgeous family and another one on the way! We are missing her greatly and although I have been working hard to cover her work, I am looking forward – as indeed are many of you - to welcoming a replacement for Mrs Barron to St. Mary's in January... Watch this space...

We have also bid a fond farewell to some of our families this term as well as welcoming new faces. Our new Nursery cohort have settled very well as have all of the children who have started St. Mary's since the Autumn Term began. It already feels like they have always been with us and I hope that our new families are already feeling very much a part of the fabric of our school.

I am really looking forward to our nativity service at the church next week – Christmas Around the World. As yet, I haven't seen it and am very excited to see what the children have been working hard on. Classroom Close-ups

Y5

Year Five's first term has flown by, we have worked hard and had fun. The start of the year saw us channel our inner Greek and Romans as part of our topic, The Great, the Bold and the Brave, a history



unit about Ancient Greece and Rome. We learned about the Greek Gods, Greek City States, forms of government, famous battles and Roman Britain. We developed our research skills and collaboration skills, when we wrote pamphlets about the Persian War. We held a lively debate about who should have the Parthenon sculptures (Elgin Marbles) and then visited them at The British Museum.

After half term we began our new topic, Look Hear, with a psychedelic sound and light party. During this science based unit, we learned how the body hears and sees, we communicated using string telephones, played our homemade guitars and conducted other scientific investigations to test our understanding.

In English we continue to perfect our writing skills, using ambitious adjectives and adding more detail with relative clauses and descriptive language. We enjoyed reading The Adventures of Odysseus, although our end of unit debate and persuasive writing task left many of us wondering if he truly was a great hero. Our second book, Clockwork by Phillip Pullman brought us into a mysterious, sinister world. For this text we explored different characters' perspectives and published our own chapter of the story.

Year Five's maths skills continue their upward rise. This term we have worked on mental strategies for all 4 operations, 12 and 24 hour time, equivalent fractions, and written methods for longer multiplication problems.

In RE we have explored faith, our own beliefs and those of others around us. As Christmas draws nearer we will explore how art and music convey the Christmas story.

Y3

This term, Year 3 have had great fun learning all about Early Man to Iron Age Man in our topic, Scavengers and Settlers. We have learned about how the first people lived, how they changed and developed over time and how the first settlements were created. We really loved solving the mystery of how Ötzi, an Ice Age hunter, lived and died.

We have also learned all about our bodies – how we hear and see, how to keep healthy and all about our bones – in our topic, How Humans Work! We particularly enjoyed testing our sight in our home made eye tests and carrying out various investigations to find out how exercise affects our bodies.



In English we loved reading all about The Iron Man in Ted Hughes classic story. We particularly enjoyed the fact that he began as a fearsome creature to champion Earth against the Space-Bat-Angel-Dragon! We have produced some fantastic pieces of writing, art work and especially enjoyed role playing the reactions of the citizens of the Earth on the arrival of the dragon.

Y1

Year One have had a jam-packed term of learning and fun! A few Highlights include, RE Day, Anti-bullying Day and DT Day! We are also excited about Christmas and have enjoyed our A-Z of Advent countdown to the birth of Jesus.

Year One started the year investigating materials with a trip to the Look Out Discovery Centre in Bracknell Forest for our topic: What's It Made of? We enjoyed climbing the lookout tower and seeing all the natural materials and building dens out of logs and branches.

This half term we have leapt straight into our new topic; Let's

Celebrate with great enthusiasm and excitement, as who doesn't love a celebration! Highlights include; learning why Bonfire night is celebrated, and getting messy making edible fireworks and



firework pictures and even a trip to Eddie Catz to celebrate Ramble's second birthday.

Year One have enjoyed listening to the story "The Tiger Who Came to Tea" and researching to find out if real tigers like to drink tea? Creating great factual posters. They found very amusing hot seating the tiger asking great questions about his insatiable appetite!

This term in RE we have been thinking about Judaism. The children enjoyed Learning about the Jewish faith especially the festival of Sukkot and making a sukkah out of Lego, Duplo or wooden blocks.

Y4

Year Four have had a fantastic time this term exploring 'Temples, Tombs and Treasures' – an exciting history based topic that began with an



exploration of an ancient Egyptian tomb – the classroom!

'Holding torches we entered the dark tomb. We were set the challenge to find fifteen secret treasures and a golden crown. Before we began we felt excited, adventurous and determined. We slowly crept around the mysterious tomb searching for the precious ancient treasures. When we discovered them we carefully sketched them. We tried not to step on any trap doors or wake the mummy. When we thought the mummy was waking up we twirled our torches on the roof to send him back to sleep.' (Y4 pupils)

We also loved reading Varjak Paw by SF Said – lots of fantastic creative writing was produced and an interesting debate was had about whether dogs are better than cats!

We have really enjoyed our RE based topics this term that included a great trip to Southwark Cathedral. The class made reflective and thoughtful contributions to our very successful RE Day in November.

Y4 have made a brilliant start to the year, working well as a team, supporting each other in all they do and rising to the challenges they are set with enthusiasm and interest.

Y2


In Year Two we have had a busy term with so many activities and experiences including: visits to the Florence Nightingale Museum and The Hindu Mandir, a Famous People party and parade, a Mad Scientists day to launch our Brainwaves Topic and a recorder concert, to name but a few! We particularly wanted to tell you about our new Super Humans topic, where we are learning about how our amazing bodies work. Two parents came to help with our topic launch: Mrs Burfitt, who spoke to the children about the importance of exercise before putting them through their paces and Mr Ghods (a dentist) and Nora (a dental hygienist), who showed the children how to keep their teeth strong and healthy. They finished the session with an all-important demonstration on how to brush teeth properly.




Two books we have been looking at in depth this term are Grace and Family and The Princess and the White Bear King. Not only have we enjoyed reading and listening to these stories but we have undertaken a range of writing activities and related artwork, one of which was designing and making crowns.

YN

This term in Nursery the children have settled in really well and made a fantastic start at St Mary's! We even moved into our brand new classroom which has been fantastic! We have seen great progress with the classes becoming increasingly independent and enjoying school more and more, exploring the environment inside and outside. A particular highlight has been our weekly cookery sessions.





We investigated changes in the world around us, particularly investigating Autumn and the different coloured leaves. We read stories, used leaves in our art and went on an Autumn walk around school, finding as many colours as we could.

This half term we have learnt more about animals, talking about the similarities and differences between them together. We even made our own "Dear Zoo" flap books, retelling the story simply! We have listened to a whole range of stories, including "Tanka Tanka Skunk" which has given us a focus on rhythm and rhyme.

We have also marked certain special occasions together; we made and painted salt dough poppies to remember the soldiers who have fought for us on Remembrance Day, and, of course, we have eagerly prepared for Christmas, focussing on why there was a special star in the sky at Jesus' birth. We decorated and painted stars, made star biscuits and star Christmas decorations.

Y6

Year Six have really impressed so far this year! Everyone has made a successful transition into their final year here at St. Mary's and the children have stepped up to the demands of being the oldest children in our school - keep it up! In English the class have enjoyed the Power of Reading text Skellig. Written work produced has included descriptions, recounts, poetry, non-chronological reports, e-mails and letters.

In mathematics the class have worked on number and place value, mental and written addition and subtraction, mental multiplication and division, perimeter and area, 3D shapes, fractions and algebra! The electricity topic - 'Full Power' - was really enjoyed, particularly when finding out about people who discovered electricity, making circuits

using different components, comparing series and parallel circuits and making an electric wire-loop game.

The school trip to The Crystal was very informative and enjoyed by all. The topic called



'What a Wonderful World' is currently being studied and the children have so far enjoyed finding out about the earth, its different biomes and how rivers have shaped the earth's landscape. PE lessons have focused on developing basketball and hockey skills, in art and design the children have looked at renaissance artists and painted self-portraits, whilst in music lessons the class have learnt about body percussion! Wow - what a lot of learning!

YR


Reception have settled into school life really well and have made a fantastic start at St. Mary's! During the first half term Reception's topic was Nursery Rhymes. The class learnt lots of different rhymes and how to continue a rhyming string. They explored the school environment looking for spiders and drainpipes for Incy Wincy Spider, created clocks for Hickory Dickory Dock and developed their counting skill with Once I Caught a Fish Alive. Independently they furthered their learning around rhymes by acting them out, creating pictures and exploring the sounds made with different instruments.

Reception were very excited to move into their new classroom mid-way through the term. "I like the colour and the walls and I like playing outside with Nursery." The class have settled well in their new space and the big white board and new toilets have been a real hit!

This half term we have been learning about 'Bears' and have particularly enjoyed our Power of Reading books. The class brought, 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt' to life by acting it out through role-play, dance and music. Reception created wonderful story maps and collage scene pictures. The class then joined 'Biscuit Bear' on his adventures in the kitchen by designing and creating their very own 'Biscuit Bears.'

Reception have been busily preparing for Christmas by reading the Nativity story, creating the advent calendar pictures, making decorations and getting in the holiday vibe with their Hawaiian Christmas song for the Christmas Service.





SayersCroftSchoolJourney

Day 1 - Tuesday 21st November 2017

Year 6 excitedly departed St. Mary's and waved goodbye to their parents. They arrived at Sayers Croft and stepped off the coach into the crisp autumnal air. Everyone was eager to unpack and make their beds! After some fun on the adventure playground, a tasty lunch was served. Afterwards the class enjoyed an orienteering activity and woodland compass trail. The weather in the afternoon was mild with a gentle breeze. Brains were then put to good use in the Team Challenges - a fun collection of puzzles for the children to solve. After dinner the class sat down to start their diary writing. The evening was filled with a 'night walk' into the woods and the class had the opportunity to explore a replica of a Celtic roundhouse. Day 2 - Wednesday 22nd November 2017

It was a chilly morning due to a brisk wind and the first activity was a study along the Coneyhurst stream. There were some hilarious moments with face painting using the wet clay from the banks of the stream. Afterwards the class enjoyed creating natural artworks using the things found in the

woods. The wind picked up for the walk up to Pitch Hill with strong gusts at the viewpoint. Everyone enjoyed the stupendous panorama and the children took a gentle stroll back to the centre. In the evening Year 6 created some clay works of art inspired by their time at Sayers Croft. By now the strong winds were whipping into a storm and so we stayed inside for a fun quiz to entertain us all before bedtime.

Day 3 - Thursday 24th November 2017

Waking up to the pouring rain after the stormy night Year 6 had an action packed day ahead. There were three activities that got everyone excited: climbing, abseiling and archery. The children had so much fun and the clouds finally cleared to reveal a bright sunny afternoon. What an exhilarating time! The late afternoon "Earthwalk" allowed opportunities for the children to focus on nature - thinking about natural sounds and colours. The evening was full of special moments, starting with the opening of letters from home, followed by a visit to the popular tuck shop and finally the disco - which was epic!

Day 4 - Friday 25th November 2017

The final day of school journey arrived and so the children packed their bags and stripped their beds! After breakfast Year 6 walked

through the village of Ewhurst in the brilliant morning sunshine to visit the local church. Here the class did a study on the church building and listened to a presentation by the lay minster. Afterwards a special assembly was conducted which reflected on the school journey experience and the achievements of the children. Autumn Term Music at St Mary's

As usual there has been lots going on in Music this term, especially with Christmas around the corner. For the first time this year, we were invited to participate in carol singing at Putney Railway Station to raise money for charity and we took Year 6, who were in fine voice, at lunchtime on Monday 4th December. The charity was Health Poverty Action, which aims to help strengthen poor and marginalised communities with their health throughout Asia, Africa and Latin America. The children were worried that there wouldn't be that many people as it wasn't during rush hour, but we needn't have worried, Putney station is always busy and we raised £130 in just half an hour! The organisers sent an email afterwards: "Your children were absolutely fantastic and with so much energy! The amount you raised is testamount to how great they were - thank you so much." So a big well done to our Year 6s.





We were also invited to take part in the Community in Music project, Britten's cantata "St Nicolas", which was held in All Saints' Church on Putney Common. The organisers came to school to hold a workshop with Year 5 where we learnt the hymns from the production and the children impressed them with their knowledge of St Nicholas and his connection with Santa Claus.

Years 1, 2 and 3 were able to show off their new instrumental skills at the first Wider Opportunities concert this year and demonstrated how quickly they have mastered playing the flute or recorder in such a short space of time.







The M:Tech project this term was Star Wars, which was as popular as ever, and we now have children who have completed Grade 7! And of course we have all been busily rehearsing for our Nativity "Christmas Around the World". The children have loved singing and learning how different music can be in different cultures.

ART

My first term has been a busy and rewarding one and I am grateful for the warm welcome from at St Mary's children, parents and staff.

In the first half of this term we have focused on developing our drawing skills using images from pre-historic cave drawings at Lascaux, the bust of Queen Nefertiti, Greek fables and the drawings of Leonardo da Vinci as our inspiration. We have practiced "drawing what we see" and where possible we draw from a three-dimensional object.

In the second half of the term we have developed our painting skills. We have created rainbows, colour charts, Christmas trees and "rainbow snow" scenes, using primary, secondary colours and understanding complementary colours. Our pencils are filed as warm, cool, monochrome colours.

I am also keen to include three-dimensional work in our lessons. Several classes have used air-drying clay to model three-dimensional mini-sculptures. Reception class turned their cones into lovely Christmas trees and other classes have made snowmen and snow women, Christmas hats and stockings. Year 5 have just finished miniature Greek red and black urns.

We introduce the children to art history in our lessons and have started a 'Painting of the Month'. This will be mostly from a free London gallery or museum, giving everyone the opportunity to see the work "in the flesh". The classroom posters were changed at half-term to include images from the Albertina and the Belvedere Museums in Vienna and Christian icons from the pre-Renaissance period. All donations of 2017 fine art calendars gratefully received!

The children are very proud of their Christmas card designs and I hope you enjoy sending their work to family and friends. I am looking forward to a very creative 2018 in the art room.
