I hope you enjoy reading about the enriched experiences we have all enjoyed this term. I am delighted that we have been able to begin to invite visitors into school and to extend children's learning outside of the classroom as we emerge from our extraordinary experiences of the last few years. One of the many highlights of the term was seeing the children's faces as we all gathered together in the hall to hear from Paul Sturgess on our second Anti-Bullying Day. The children were hugely inspired by Paul's visit, but the most rewarding experience was feeling that 'St. Mary's spirit' that I so often took for granted in the past. It is a spirit felt most strongly when we are all gathered together for a shared experience or purpose, and it has been greatly missed. It has been a real privilege to feel it re-emerge over the last few weeks, especially on days like Red Nose Day and when listening to the children sing during worship or perform at The Spring Concert. School Council

The school council have been focused on how they can use their roles as councillors to improve the lives of those around them. They have presented four charities to the rest of the school and have asked them to vote on which one they would like to raise money for. On Friday 25th March they carried out a litter pick in the local area. The route for the pick was planned by Rudy in Year Six and the council hope that they will be able to write to other local school councils and ask if they would be willing to provide teams of litter pickers to keep Putney litter free. Anna and Felix in Year Four have designed a poster to inspire local people to keep Putney litter free. Councillors were given a small budget at the start of the year. They have used this to buy recycling bins which will be placed in every classroom and have prepared guidance to go with the bins on what can and cannot be recycled. Xavier in Year Six wrote to Wandsworth Council about the litter on the pavements on bin collection day. CLASS FOCUS

Y2

Year 2 have had a fantastic term full of fun and learning.
We have enjoyed discovering information about women who changed the world in history.
Mapping the trajectory of flying objects such as a tennis ball and scrunched up paper, just like Katherine Johnson. We explored the unfairness of history by partaking in a race where some of the children started at



different positions. Highlighting the many accounts of people within history who lived under unfair and disadvantaged conditions yet made a huge impact on world history.

In RE we loved learning about different types of Christian crosses and choose a particular style of cross to make out of plasticine. We liked looking at the symbols of Easter as it made us excited for Easter Sunday when we can enjoy a chocolate egg or two. Especially as we now understand, what eggs symbolise in the Easter Story. We have also loved our class text 'Major Glad, Major Dizzy' and thinking about the passing of time through the eyes of toy soldier. A particular highlight has been bringing in our own favourite toys to discuss with the class and following instructions to make our own peg soldiers!

Other highlights of the term include Red Nose Day, practising our song for Mother's Day, anti-bullying day and of course meeting Paul Sturgess!

Y4

It certainly has been a busy Spring Term for Year 4! In our geography lessons the class have been thinking about how to protect the rainforest. In our history lessons they have been learning about Ancient Greece, in particular the Gods worshipped and the myths associated with them. Early on in the spring term, we read the historical novel 'Escape from Pompeii', where we imagined ourselves as Roman children making life-changing decisions whilst Mount Vesuvius erupted.



This enabled the children to produce some great writing, including reflective diary entries. The volcano theme was further explored with the novel 'When the Giant Stirred', which focuses on nature's remarkable ability to renew itself. The children have been working on creating first-person narratives based on this story as if they were villagers reacting to the unknown!

Year 4 were extremely lucky to be given the exciting opportunity to visit The Wimbledon Synagogue at the beginning of the second half of term. We have studied the customs and practises of the Jewish faith in our RE topic so being able to visit the Jewish place of worship and apply our knowledge and ask questions further has been an enriching experience for all who attended.

Y6

If only we could stop time – Year 6's journey through St Mary's is flying by, luckily we are having fun along the way. An obvious highlight was Sayers Croft - we came back dirty and tired, but with lasting memories. We continue to build our independence ahead of secondary school. Now that everyone has had an opportunity to be a school leader, on this second round, we have been applying for work experience within school. Some fantastic opportunities have been had throughout the school; leading story time in Early Years has been a highlight. In English we have been writing non-fiction texts and balanced arguments inspired by a book about the Galapagos Islands. This complemented our Science topic of Adaptation and Inheritance. In PSHE, we have had Diversity Role Models come to trial a new Lego-based programme, it's been a wonderful platform to learn that we are richer in a diverse community. In History, we have been studying how the Industrial Revolution changed Britain; it has given us a new appreciation for our school days, factory work does not sound appealing. Finally, leading up to Easter, we have looked at where we can find hope in the Easter Story. Only one term left for us, the best is yet to come!



YR

We have had another busy term in Reception class. During the first half term the children explored the topic of journeys, particularly looking at the book "Let's All Creep Through Crocodile Creek" by



Jonathan Lambert. We have acted out the story, written down what the characters might say, and made our own crocodiles out of junk modelling! We also took part in a Perform drama workshop together, where we pretended to be jungle explorers.

Since half term we have been learning all about pirates, which has really inspired us all! We started our topic by solving a treasure hunt, which led to a mysterious treasure chest. We have since created our own wanted posters, drawn beautiful parrots in art, learnt about pirate ships, and reasoned whether we would choose to be a pirate if we could, to name just a few activities!

In Maths the class have been exploring the number line in close detail, and learning what it really represents. We have worked on comparing numbers, working out what bigger numbers are composed of, and explored doubles as well as odd and even numbers.

Reception have loved joining the rest of the St Mary's community for some events this term, firstly for our visit from the world's tallest basketball player, and finally to treat our mummies to a special performance for the Mother's Day service at the church.

Well done for another super term everyone!

Y5

Year 5, have had such a wonderful spring term. In science, we have loved learning all about Space. The children have enjoyed researching how theories about the Earth have evolved over time, from the Ancient Vikings to modern day NASA. We went speed dating as different planets and we have been exploring how day and night occur. We cannot wait for all this knowledge to be brought together during our trip to the planetarium.

Furthermore, in English we have been reading the inspiring story of Chris Hadfield (the Canadian astronaut) in preparation for writing his biography.

Our minds were put to the test recently when we tried to complete some ancient Maya maths. This involved representing the Maya numeral system using only shells, pebbles and sticks. Once the numbers were bigger than 19 this became particularly challenging! Whilst learning all about the Ancient Maya we have also designed and built our own Mayan cities using Lego (although I am not sure that is what they would have used at the time). We have had yet another fantastic term and we cannot wait to see what the summer term brings.



Y1

Year 1 have had a busy but fun Spring term. We have absolutely loved our English sessions based on 'The Curious Case of the Missing Mammoth' by Ellie Hattie. It has been great fun following Timothy



and Oscar as they follow the trail of Teddy's mammoth mayhem though the museum and the story has inspired some great writing too.

We have also enjoyed learning all about the history of our school and exploring how it has changed over the years as well as the role the church played in the founding of the school. It was fun thinking about how different life would have been for the very first St Mary's students!

Our favourite subject this term, though, has been science in which we have been learning all about different animals! We have learned all about how to identify, describe, sort, and classify animals. We had a lot of fun examining our terrapin, Thor, and deciding what kind of animal he is!

We have loved having several fun, off-timetable days too including an amazing basketball session with Paul Sturgess, during which we practised our basketball skills and learned all about resilience. We also had a great time learning about the power of laughter for Comic Relief and had a great time making each laugh!

YN

The spring term has been really action packed in Nursery! The class welcomed several new children this half term and they have all settled in brilliantly to St. Mary's! Straight after Christmas, we centred our learning around a different traditional tale each week. Our book area gained a Puppet Show, and it was lovely to see lots of singing, puppet shows and retellings of "The Gingerbread Man" and "The Three Billy



Goats Gruff' going on. We were really impressed by the children's increasing knowledge and recall of these stories. Together we have been ordering stories, joining in with repeated parts, and thinking lots about different characters: we have described, painted and drawn them, even making some different types of puppets by ourselves. Since half term, we have been learning more about plants and flowers together. We have planted and watched many different seeds and bulbs grow, including bean, daffodils, sunflowers, and cress. The class are growing in their understanding of the world around them and how things grow and change over time.

Children also put in lots of energy and love into celebrating Mother's Day – children planted, made cards, and baked cakes, and together we celebrated with our families in the Nursery classroom. It was lovely to welcome the parents back into school after such a long time.

Nursery should be really proud of all their hard work this term!

y3

This spring term the Y3 children have really enjoyed their DT (Design & Technology) project on mechanisms and making pneumatic toys. They had to learn about pneumatic systems and draw sketch diagrams to show their ideas for their own pneumatic toy. Using simple resources like shoe boxes, egg cartons, tubes and balloons they assembled and created their 'monstrous' toys. In maths the children have worked on multiplication and division, money and statistics. In English they wrote their own adventure stories based on the story 'Stone Age Boy' by Satoshi Kitamura and more recently have enjoyed reading the information text 'Big Blue Whale' by Nicola Davies.

Year 3 have also enjoyed learning about Volcanoes and Earthquakes in geography, the Ancient Egyptians in history and for science they have been investigating light and shadows. The children have filmed their own presentations on a chosen topic using green screen technology in their computing lessons and for RE the class have explored Jesus through his 'I am' statements. Other highlights have included playing recorders, swimming at Putney Leisure Centre and singing

'Colour My World' - their song for Mother's Day.

Background
