In English lessons, the class

have engaged with reading 'Journey' and 'Giraffa Ziraffa' - they absolutely adored these stories and have been able to write letters, diary entries, descriptions and persuasions in response to these texts. In maths the children have worked mostly on fractions, time and properties of shapes.

Elsewhere in the curriculum, Year 3 geography lessons looked at contrasting locations by comparing the UK with St. Lucia; in history lessons the ancient Shang dynasty of China was studied; and for science they have been learning about plants.

In RE the class have been finding out about another world faith - Islam - and trying to understand what it means to be a Muslim and how they show their commitment to their faith. This topic saw the class go on a school trip visit to the London Central Mosque at Regents Park. The children were able to see for themselves the important features of a Muslim's place of worship and were very fortunate to be invited into the prayer hall to witness people praying. 
