CLASSROOM CLOSE-UPS

Y3

Wowsers - the children of Year 3 are doing superbly and they are really enjoying the learning... In English the class are currently reading Winter's Child by Angela McAllister and are thoughtfully thinking about



how to develop their use of rich and varied vocabulary. Our picture books really help to inspire their writing! In maths the children have been mastering their understanding of place value, their skills in addition and subtraction and are now tackling multiplication and division. In RE the class learnt about the importance of The Bible and it's 'big story'; they are now finding out about monastic communities and the daily lives of some monks and nuns. The science topic on rocks and fossils was extremely exciting - especially as the class were given the task of conducting a rock survey of Putney! What rock do you think the school is made of? Is it natural rock or man-made? The history topic on the Stone, Bronze and Iron Ages has been very informative and the class trip to Butser Ancient Farm, a recreated prehistoric settlement, was enjoyed by all. The children were able to experience what life may have been like for our prehistoric ancestors and even got to make their own jewellery!

Y5

What a wonderful start to year 5 we have been having! In English we have been learning all about fairy tales. We

have been thinking carefully about how to make our writing appropriate for its audience. So we put this to the test when we wrote and performed our fairy tales for Year 2. To Year 5's relief they seemed to really enjoy them!

Year 5 have fully embraced their new science topic 'Forces'! We particularly enjoyed making and testing parachutes from different materials, investigating which material made the best parachute and why and discussing the forces



that were acting upon the parachute as it fell.

In the run up to Christmas we have begun to get festive! We enjoyed painting our shepherds on their journey to visit Jesus. We painted these in the style of aboriginal art work, linking it to some of the learning we enjoyed during Black History Month.

On top of all of this, Y5 have been enriching their learning with some amazing experiences. We especially enjoyed our trip to Southfields Academy for Junior Citizens, where we learned some vital skills and lessons to keep us safe as we gain more independence.

Y1

Year 1 have had a brilliant term and have settled into the new year well. We have had a lot of fun and are enjoying the learning! We have especially loved learning all about the Jewish faith and have really enjoyed learning all about the different Jewish festivals and celebrations. We planned how to get ready for Shabbat, took part in Rosh Hashanah celebrations and decorated our own Sukkah for Sukkot!



One of our highlights of the term has been Black History Month. We learned all about Thandi Ojeer and had a fantastic time learning about her clothing company and designing our own clothes! We also enjoyed taking part in a workshop during which we learned all about Floella Benjamin. Our favourite book this term has been 'Nibbles the Book Monster' by Emma Yarlett. We've had a great time chasing naughty Nibbles through various fairy tales and exploring how his nibbling has changed the stories!

It has been wonderful to welcome two new Nursery classes to St Mary's this term, and to see the amazing progress each child has already made, as they have settled into a new setting and routine.

We started out by learning "All About Me." The children learnt about recognising their emotions with the help of 'The Colour Monster!' In the story, 'Colour Monster'



equates a different colour with each emotion. The children are very good at naming emotions and are beginning to recognise them in themselves and others. They then created their very own Colour Monsters in the creative area. The classes have also spent time observing the world around them as the weather has changed. We learnt about Autumn, and have been learning how to mix colours, to create wonderful leaf prints.

In the second half of term, we centred our learning on 'Animals.' Children have become really engaged by the stories we have looked at together, especially 'Tanka Tanka Skunk.' They have been using a range of instruments to perform sections of the story. Towards the end of term, the children have been excitedly

Y4

Year 4 have experienced a busy start to the Autumn Term, packed with a range of opportunities and experiences. In our English, we have been thinking about the elements of a story and using that structure to create our very own unique stories that draw the reader in. This has led to our most recent piece of work where we are focusing on stories from different character perspectives. Fantastic storytellers on display already!

Our current topic in Science on 'Electricity' is a wonderful opportunity for the class to understand and explore the many components that are needed for our everyday electrical appliances. We have had the opportunity to create our own circuits containing switches and buzzers which we believe will further our knowledge and push our inquisitive minds! Year Two have had a smooth transition to the Autumn Term and have soaked up every learning opportunity with relish. This term has been busy, and jam packed full of learning. Some of our highlights have included learning facts about owls in our English lessons; exploring outside and identifying living things in science, learning about Black History Month and Guy Fawkes in history and making Diyas lamps and discovering why



Diwali is celebrated in our RE lessons. We have enjoyed so many captivating enrichment opportunities such as our Black History workshop 'My Friend Flo' led by Bigfoot Arts Education, Anti-Bullying Day and two school trips! Our trip to Tilford allowed us to use our geographical skills, compare features of a small town with Putney, use geographical language to describe the physical and human features and use simple compass directions.

This trip also had cross-curricular links with PSHE, history and English as we located the Dragon's Teeth and learnt that they are square-pyramid shaped defensive walls first used during the Second World War to block the movement of tanks. We also learnt the history of the school hall and key dates of other human and physical features of Tilford. We wrote letters to describe Putney and ourselves and received letters back, so the children were excited to meet their pen pals and work together to explore.

We are all very excited for Christmas and have enjoyed getting festive with lots of different Christmas activities. We've had a busy term of learning and it has been so much fun!

Y6

Our final year at St Mary's is off to a roaring start, we've been working hard in school learning about light and electricity in Science; the Golden Age of Islam in History; fractions and long division in Maths; the liturgy in RE; and much more. On top of our usual work, we've had engaging visitors and have gone on a number of exciting trips. A visit from TfL London taught us about safety as we start to travel more independently. Our trip to Southwark Cathedral left us mesmerised as we gazed up at Gaia, a huge sculpture of our beautiful Mother Earth. The workshop, as part of the visit, introduced us to Climate Justice and our obligations as world citizens. We finished our Geography topic about rivers with a trip to Fulham Palace to learn more about the Thames River where we went on the foreshore, found a number of creatures, and tested the water. We now know that the Thames is a very healthy river. Our Godly Play session at St Mary's Church was made even better with a Eucharist discussion from Reverend John and trip up the tower of the Church. We look forward to all that next term has in store.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

The school had a wonderful time exploring Black British History. We explored a variety of people from a variety of backgrounds who have and are contributing to Black history.

Reception and Nursery had a blast creating their own wonderful paintings inspired by Frank Bowling and Pearl Alcock. Meanwhile, Year 2 danced up a storm learning about the history of the Notting Hill Carnival while Year 1 delved into the fashion world, looking at the influence of African patterns on fashion design.

Up in KS2, Year 3 learned all about inspiring black people in television (including Sir Trevor McDonald and Moira Stuart) while Year 4 looked at the achievements of Walter Tull, exploring racism and bias in the sporting world. Year 5 became activists, learning all about the need for activism and designing their own Black Panther inspired logos while Year 6 became poets using the works of Valerie Bloom as inspiration.

The highlight was the KS2 workshop, 'Hidden Figures', during which the children learned all about historical, Black figures (such as Severus Septimius, Emperor of Rome) who you have probably never heard of! All in all, it was a great way to celebrate and mark the month!

We've been very busy in Music again this term, both in lessons and in extra-curricular activities.

In Early Years the children have been exploring the different sounds our voices and instruments make, for example in Reception we've been making sounds using instruments for the story "The Three Little Pigs" - so many different sounds to choose from! In Key Stage 1 we built on our knowledge of pitch and in Year 2 we learned the names for different pitches and drawing patterns to show the rhythm of a song we know, the first step to formal notation. In Key Stage 2 we have been creating our own compositions linked in with the class topics and everyone has enjoyed listening back to their creations for our evaluations. We've discovered it's so useful to do this so we can improve for next time!

Year 3 have started to learn the recorder and Year 4 the flute this year in their Whole Class Ensemble Tuition sessions and both classes have made a great start to mastering their instruments. They showed off their hard work at their first concert to parents at the end of this term. We look forward to seeing how they progress even further during the year! With Christmas performances last year having to be recorded or cancelled as audiences were not permitted, we have all been so looking forward to resuming our busy festive performance schedule.

Our Key Stage One Choir went back to the Platt Centre for the first time since 2019 to sing Christmas carols and delighted the patrons with their carol singing and instrument playing. It was so lovely to be back again, they make us feel very welcome (the juice afterwards is always popular!). The choir was also invited to sing at the St Mary's Church Christmas Tea for the elderly and isolated, which was a big honour and again, it helped to put everyone there in a festive mood. The children loved having the opportunity to perform at two venues and they were so well behaved. They certainly looked the part in their festive headgear!





The popular M:Tech (music technology club) has re-started this term (after lockdowns). It's now after school as a one-hour club and the children are making such good progress in their compositions. The project this term was Virtual Reality, which has definitely inspired the children, and the Golden Disc winners' work will be played in our final assembly of the term.

The Art Room has been busy and productive. One of the first tasks in the term is for St Mary's artists from Nursery to Year 6 to draw on their knowledge of the Nativity to create fine Christmas Card designs. Skills in colour mixing, mark making, drawing, painting, printmaking, modelling have been developed alongside an excitement at the work. Children in Monday's drawing club continue to impress with their enthusiasm and effort in

tackling a range of subjects with different materials.

FOSMS NEWS

FoSMS have started the 2022/23 academic year with a bang and parents have shown great support for events and other fundraising initiatives this term. The money raised by FoSMS really makes a difference in terms of extra resources and

activities for St Mary's pupils and it has been amazing to see parents really getting behind FoSMS as we return to a full programme of events post-Covid. On 10th November the school welcomed back the Quiz Night to the hall after a 2-year hiatus. This was a fantastically fun night, with 10 teams - including parents, teachers and Governors - battling it out to be crowned Quiz Champions. The glory ultimately went to a table of Y6 and Y5 parents led by Kate Bolton - congratulations! There was a great atmosphere and the hall looked amazing, with everyone embracing the challenge to decorate their tables - well done in particular to the Reception table, which was named "Best Decorated Table" by Miss Payne (see photo). The final amount raised was an incredible £2,540 - thank you to everyone who participated!

The other main event of the term was of course the Christmas Fair, held on Saturday 3rd December. This was another roaring success with the whole school community getting involved in Christmas crafts, games, and ever-popular stalls such as the tombola, Santa shoot out, "jolly jam jars" and "glitter and glow", alongside some festive food and drink and a surprise visit by Santa himself. This event relied on an army of parent and staff volunteers, and it was fantastic to see all the children and adults, having such a brilliant time kicking off the festive season at St Mary's. The total amount raised was still being confirmed as we went to press, but we are confident it will have been a great result! Alongside the Christmas Fair, parents have shown great support for two other Christmas-related fundraising initiatives. Lots of families purchased Christmas cards, gift tags, wrapping paper and other items with their child's individual design on, with a percentage of all sales going to the school. The finished items looked great and this raised £427. Miss Payne also selected three of the children's designs as the school's official Christmas e-cards. The Christmas Raffle was also a huge success, offering the chance to win one of eight

amazing hampers put together by each year group as well as a host of other great prizes - again, the amount raised will be announced as soon as possible. At a busy time of year for fundraising, parents also got into the World Cup spirit by taking part in a Sweepstake for each year group. Alongside raising money for the classroom, this offered the chance to win a cash prize per sweepstake as well as each entry going into a prize draw to win an England football shirt from the '96 Euros signed by the England legend Paul Gascoigne (won by a parent of year 5 pupil). This raised a fantastic £1850, which the teaching staff decided to spend on immediate classroom needs and sportsrelated equipment.

> The money raised from these events and initiatives has paid for some brilliant extra activities for the children this term, including the Black History Month Pupil Workshops (cost £1,000), Anti-Bullying Workshops (cost \pm 850), and a visit from external theatre companyies to perform two Christmas pantomimes for the children which they absolutely loved: The Clumsiest Elf (for EYFS on 12th Dec (see photo) and Robin Hood (for KS1 and 2) on the 8th Dec (cost £900. It also paid for

the Christmas trees inside and outside the school, Christmas decorations, materials for the class craft decorations making (which your child will bring home at the end of term for you to keep) and other Christmas celebrations. Money raised by FoSMS events and initiatives also contributes to some of the core running costs of the school every year, including a key Learning Resources platform subscription, teachers resources, books and equipment

(typically around £4,000 per year), and additional extra-curricular activities such as swimming lessons (typically around £1,000 per year) and sports participation. We are very grateful to parents for their continued support, both in terms of donating money and volunteering their time. Next term we are looking forward to the Family Disco and Challenge Day as the key fundraising events.
