It is hoped that, as well as creating fantastic spaces for our school community to work and play in that we will be able to hire out our multi-use games areas in order to create additional revenue for the school. The garden area, which we hope will include a gated pond, will be used to enhance children's learning across the curriculum, but especially in Science, Geography and Design Technology. Plans also include an Eco-Classroom for a class of up to thirty children which will hopefully contain energy panels to help us to track our energy use; allowing classes to work outside in all weathers. CLASSROOM CLOSE-UPS

Y3

Doesn't time fly when you are having funt's already the end of the spring term and Year 3 have definitely enjoyed their time at school with all of the learning and various events taking place.



Highlights have included Safer Internet Day, Number Day, World Book Day and our visits to St. Mary's Church for Godly Play and the Natural History Museum for a class trip! The class have thoroughly enjoyed their investigative work on light and shadow in science, as well as the explosive learning about volcanoes and earthquakes in geography. They have more recently been learning about the mysterious Ancient Egyptians in history and for RE the class have explored Jesus through his 'I am' statements and the Beatitudes. In maths the children have worked on multiplication and division, money, statistics and measuring length. In English they wrote their own exciting adventure stories based on the book 'Stone Age Boy' by Satoshi Kitamura and more recently have enjoyed reading the information text 'Big Blue Whale' by Nicola Davies. In other news the class have continued to learn to play recorders and are eagerly awaiting the start of swimming lessons at Putney Leisure Centre next term - watch this space!

Year 1 have had a very busy and fun Spring term. We have absolutely loved our English sessions based on 'The Curious Case of the Missing Mammoth' by Ellie Hattie. We have had great fun following Timothy and Oscar as they chase Teddy on his path of mammoth mayhem though the museum! We have also enjoyed learning all about the history of our school and exploring how it has

changed over the years as well as the role the church played



in the founding of the school. It was fun thinking about how different life would have been for the very first St Mary's students and interesting to find out how it all started! Our favourite subject this term, though, has been science in which we have been learning all about different animals! We have learned all about how to identify, describe, sort, and classify animals. We love animals and even had a go at creating our own animals!

We have loved having several fun, off-timetable days too including World Book Day and Anti-Bullying Day! We especially enjoyed learning about myths and legends, finding out which characters everyone was dressed as and writing our very own myths!

Y5

Year 5 have had such a wonderful spring term. Our minds were put to the test recently when we tried to complete

some ancient Maya maths. This involved representing the Maya numeral system using only shells, pebbles and sticks. Once the numbers were bigger than 19 this became particularly challenging! Whilst learning all about Ancient Maya we have also designed and built our own Mayan cities using Lego (although I am not sure that is what they would have used at the time). In science, we have loved learning all about Space. The children have enjoyed



researching how theories about the Earth have evolved over time, from the Ancient Vikings to modern day NASA. We cannot wait for all this knowledge to be brought together during our trip to the planetarium.

Furthermore, in English we have been reading the inspiring story of Chris Hadfield (the Canadian astronaut) in preparation for writing his biography.

We have had yet another fantastic term and we cannot wait to see what the summer term brings.

YN

The spring term has been very busy in Nursery! We welcomed several new children this term and they have all settled in brilliantly to St. Mary's! After Christmas, we learnt about Traditional tales. We enhanced our book area with lots of puppets and the children have enjoyed creating puppet shows retelling the stories they have learnt such as



The Gingerbread Man, The Three Billy Goats Gruff and Goldilocks and the Three Bears. We were really impressed by the children's increasing knowledge and recall of these stories. Together we have been ordering stories, joining in with repeated parts, and thinking lots about different characters.

Since half term, we have been learning more about plants and flowers together. We have planted and watched many different seeds and bulbs grow, including beans, daffodils, sunflowers, and cress. The class are growing in their understanding of the world around them and how things grow and change over time.

Children also put in lots of energy and love into celebrating Mother's Day - children planted, made cards and learnt a special Mother's Day song. Together we celebrated with our families in the Nursery classroom. It was lovely to welcome the parents in for our celebration. Nursery should be really proud of all their hard work this term!

Y4

Throughout our Spring term, Year Four immersed themselves in learning about the digestive system, undergoing an experiment which imitated the function of each organ to assist their overall understanding both kinaesthetic and visually. They also learnt about the mechanics of teeth and animal food chains.

During our English lessons, the class have been exploring a picture-book text called "When the Giant Stirred", where children have placed themselves in the perspective of a villager, learning to empathise with the characters and events that occur throughout the story. The class then created their own narrative that reflects the storyline of the text, from the perspective of the young boy. Year 4 have been working extremely hard during mathematics, learning about area and fractions. We have used real-world connections to better understand the purpose and use of fractions in our everyday lives, helping us

all realise that numeracy is all around us!

Finally, in History we learnt about the invasion and the legacy that the Roman Empire left behind, and the cultural impact they had on Britain. For our World Book Day, our school theme was Myths and Legends, which tied in well. Some students decided to dress as Roman legends! Well done to Year 4 for powering through this term!



If you were to stop by Year 6's classroom at any given time, you would see everyone hard at work; we are determined to absorb all the knowledge that we can in our last few terms at St Mary's. Our mathematical abilities continue to astound. In maths this term we became skilled in measurement and conversions, fractions, decimals and percentages. With a lot of hard work and some fantastic texts to inspire us (The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe and Odysseus), our narrative writing skills continue to improve. We now expertly use a variety of punctuation, sentence starters and precise language. Our RE trip to the Buddhapadipa Temple in Wimbledon was fantastic. It helped us to gain a better understanding of the Buddhist faith that we studied class. It is amazing that a temple so serene and impressive is that close to us in Putney. In history, we learned about the Industrial Revolution. We think it is very cool how Britain lead the world in innovation and we are especially happy that children our age now

have the right to go to school, rather than having to work in factories. In science, we learned how to classify living things and look forward to visiting Richmond Park next term to learn more about invertebrates. Watch out St Mary's next term Y6 will show that the best is still yet to come!



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Year 2 have had a wonderful term full of fun, learning and enrichment. Linking with our class text 'Major Glad, Major Dizzy' and thinking about the passing of time through the eyes of toy soldier's, we participated in a science and history workshop on toys and their materials at Fulham Palace. We learnt about how toys have changed through the 20th century and got to handle authentic and replica 20th century toys played with by children during the early, mid and late 20th century. After learning about porcelain dolls in our story, the children were able to touch a real Victorian porcelain doll

Other highpoints of our trip included; sorting toys onto a

timeline, and creating imaginary toys, producing our own 'make do and mend' peg dolls, inspired by the Fisher family who lived in the Palace during World War II and lastly, we enjoyed looking at recycling and how modern toys can be made from reused waste plastic.



We have also enjoyed, Number Day, Mental Health Week, Safer Internet Day, World Book Day, practising our song for Mother's Day, Anti-Bullying Day, researching habitats in science and lastly DT where we have learnt to join two pieces of fabric together using a running stich. We were amazed by how tricky this was and gained great appreciation for how our clothes and other textiles are made. We really enjoyed putting our newfound skills to the test by making our mothers a gift for Mother's Day!

YR

We have had another busy term in Reception!
During the first half-term, the children explored our topic,
'Journeys' where we thought about local journeys we make.
We looked at different modes of transport including looking
at the differences between transport in the past and
present.

This half-term, we have been learning about pirates. We had a 50/50 split when reasoning whether we would choose to be a pirate or not with great use of new vocabulary. The children have created wanted posters, written lists of what might be in a treasure chest, drawn beautiful parrots in art, role played as pirates and overall had lots of fun. The children have explored different sea creatures and were able to present to an audience what they had made confidently.

Reception have enjoyed multiple off-timetable days this term. NSPCC Number Day was lots of fun, the children were very excited going on a number hunt. The children thoroughly enjoyed their puzzle workshop.



NUMBER DAY

On February 10th, St Mary's celebrated Number Day. It was a fun day to 'dress for digits' to raise money for NSPCC, an important charity for children. The costumes were impressive, we had human calculators, examples of Pi and repeating patterns, to name a few. The whole school was off the regular timetable for the day, each teacher hosted a different activity and the children moved around the school learning about different aspects of maths. Every class also attended a workshop from 'The





Happy Puzzle Company' that required the children to solve hands-on challenges in order to find a treasure. The day was a huge success, the children were clearly excited about maths and worked collaboratively to problem solve. Many children also brought their learning home; we received numerous pictures of children using maths in their daily lives. Thank you to FOSMs for funding the workshop.



GODLY PLAY

Year 3 were the last of the Key Stage 2 classes to visit St. Mary's Church for Godly Play this term. They loved their time spent in the Godly Play room and were captivated by the re-telling of the Parable of the Good Shepherd. Taking time out from the busy school day to take part in Godly Play reminds the children of the presence of God and helps them to focus on their own spirituality. We are very grateful to the Ministry Team at St. Mary's Church for providing the opportunity for classes to experience Godly Play and special thanks must be given to Nikki Cornfield for coordinating these wonderful sessions. Next term our Key Stage 1 classes will look forward to their Godly Play sessions.



WORLD BOOK DAY

We had such a wonderful time celebrating World Book Day at St Mary's this term. When it came to costumes, a fantastic effort was made by all children and staff alike. One child in Nursery even dressed up as the Greek God Artemis - who she is named after! Thank you to everyone for all of the help, support and preparation that went into these.

Throughout the day the children enjoyed a range of activities. Every child had a chance to sit in the 'hot seat', becoming their character and telling the rest of their class all about themselves and the myth or legend which they came from.





The children read a selection of short myths and legends and enjoyed exploring different mythological creatures through storytelling, illustrations and small world characters. Furthermore, each class in Key Stages One and Two created their very own myth or legend which they are looking forward to sharing with another class later on in the termwe can't wait to see what each class has come up with! In Reception and Nursery, every child created their own mythical creature stick puppet and developed a short story or narrative with their stick puppet. In addition to all this, every class in the school enjoyed a 'Myths around the World' workshop, where they watched a gripping reading of myths from all different parts of the world including Ancient Egypt & Wales.

MUSIC

The Music Room has been generating a lot of noise from various projects and activities across the year groups in their music lessons - we often have other classes smiling through the windows as they walk past! The Early Years have been enjoying exploring their creativity through listening and moving to different styles of music linked to their classroom topics and learning how to play the wide range of percussion instruments we have with expression and control. Key Stage One have been honing their understanding of pitch, pulse and rhythm through singing games, playing instruments and listening to music. In Key Stage Two the children have been listening to a wide range of music, from Debussy to Bob Marley and from China to Egypt. They have been using the music as a springboard for their various projects, including exploring the pentatonic scale, creating their own group compositions, playing triad chords as an accompaniment and learning about fusion music. Outside of music lessons, Year 3 has continued to learn the recorder and Year 4 the flute through the Wandsworth Music Service and they all performed a short concert at the end of term. I understand that the children are working well towards earning the coveted different coloured 'belts' that show progress, not necessarily needing the help of the ever-encouraging badgers! The Key Stage One Choir has enjoyed learning several songs, with several seemingly to be about food this term! MTech has also continued after school, with their project being Space this term. I've been invited to listen to their creations when I've popped in and I'm never ceased to be amazed by how intricate their compositions are. Each term the MTech tutors select who they think worked the hardest and produced their best work and these children are awarded with very special Gold Disc awards. The children this term are Arthur and Noah in Year 4, and Anna and Jasmine in Year 5. Well done to you all!




Collaboration and recycling have been key to the success of several projects in the Art room this term. Our Morph will be part of a London wide trail of sculptures fund raising for Whizz kidz , a children's wheelchair charity. FOSMS NEWS

It's been another great term for FoSMS fundraising activities with the highlight being the Family Disco held on 4th March at St Mary's Church (see photos attached). Around 100 families joined in the fun, with DJ Mike returning once again with a great combination of music and games, alongside face painting, a very popular tuck shop and glow toys stall, and a bar - all manned by a brilliant team of parent volunteers coordinated by the Y2 organising committee of Heidi, Gabbi, Louise and Karen. Big shout out to Sophie and Tracey as well for their amazing efforts running the tuck shop and face painting. It was a truly wonderful event and we raised just under £2,900 for the school, which is a fantastic total!

In addition to the school disco, each year group has held another Friday bake sale to raise funds which go directly to each class. These have been very well supported and are much loved by the children (and adults - who doesn't love a Friday cake?!). Examples of how recent bake sale funds have been used by the class teachers include a new mud kitchen and equipment for YR, extra craft materials for Mother's Day and Easter activities, and new books and games.

Money raised by FoSMS events and initiatives continues to make a real difference in terms of extra resources and activities for St Mary's pupils and we are very grateful for the support shown by our amazing school community. This term FoSMS funding has paid for some brilliant workshops enjoyed by the children on Number Day (£515) and World Book Day (£495), and will also cover the cost of Y3 swimming lessons which are due to start shortly (approx. £1000). The money raised from last term's World Cup sweepstake has been spent on some great new playground equipment including new bats and balls, skipping ropes, play tunnels and dance wands, and Mr Lally has also selected some new sports equipment which is currently on order and a new 3 X 3m Gazebo. FoSMS also contributes funding to some of the core running costs of the school every year, including a key Learning Resources subscription, teacher resources, books and equipment (typically around £4,000 a year) and various additional extracurricular activities, including the ever popular Easter egg hunt.

Huge thanks to all parents for their continued support, both in terms of money and volunteering their time. Next term we are looking forward to a Family games night, Sports Day, and of course the Summer Fair on 1st July. See you there!











ST. MARY'S ECO-COMMITTEE NEWS

This term we began our journey towards St. Mary's becoming an Eco-School.
