At the time of writing we still have many highlights of a normal summer term at St. Mary's to look forward to... The summer fair is this weekend, Sports Days are coming over the next two weeks; and Year Six and Key Stage Two are acting, singing and dancing in preparation for their production of 'Troy Story'. These are all of the wonderful events that help us to celebrate the hard work that has been achieved over the year. They speak to our recipe for success, which is the concrete partnership that our families develop with the school. There is strong evidence to show that the more parents positively engage with their child's school, the greater the child's academic success and we are fortunate to have such solid support from our parent body. I would like to say a huge thank you to Sarah Moss and all of the parents on the FoSMS Committee for their support and amazing fundraising efforts this year. To all of the parents who have supported school trips and events; and



those who have volunteered to read and work with staff and pupils in school - I say a big thank you on behalf of all of us here at St. Mary's.

It is no secret that school budgets are getting tighter. Despite this, we continue to offer a broad and balanced curriculum to the children of St. Mary's, increasing and adding to provision. This term alone, pupils have been to The Natural History Museum, Barnes Literary Festival, St. Mary-Le-Bow Church, Bockett's Farm, Legoland and Holland Park to name a few of the destinations in which pupils have extended their learning outside the classroom. Mrs Bishop has forged a link with Holly Lodge in Richmond Park as part of our work on extending outdoor learning and all of the children in Years One to Six have visited the Lodge to extend their outdoor learning.

Speaking of outdoor learning, we are hoping that work will commence on the first zone (see picture below) of our playground development over the summer break. The poor quality of the surface of the upper playground means we will be starting at the top of our ambitious plan and working our way down. We can't yet afford the tiered seating shown in the plan (£9k) but hope to install this at a later date. I would like to say a very special thank you to the families who have made additional donations and/or offered their services to support this development. As we know – our Bicentennial celebrations got us off to a great start on our fundraising by giving us a whopping foundation of £35,000 which FoSMS have match funded. Thank you to all of our stakeholders past and present. I am very grateful to our fantastic board of governors who continue to provide us with challenge and support, but who have also donated generously from their fund to support this first phase of works totalling around £115,000. The next phase of works – Zone Two – will see the installation of a garden and Eco Classroom, which will enable us to extend our outdoor learning programme and embed this in our basic offer for all pupils. It is hoped that our playground space will not only create revenue, but also serve as a unique selling point for our school, encouraging more families to choose St. Mary's. More pupils equal more public funding. Having used most of our reserves to complete the first zone of works fundraising for Zone Two, estimated to cost around £110,000, will begin in earnest in the Autumn. If you or a company that you work for, or know of, would be able to contribute financially to the further development of our playground – or you know of available grant funding – please see Mrs Abraham, our School Business Manager.

Before I sign off, I would like to say two final, but very important, words of thanks. Firstly to our children, it continues to be a pleasure to come to work in a school where children come each day, ready to learn and focused on their education. I hope all of our pupils have a summer break filled with fun and love and I look forward to seeing them in September, full of their usual enthusiasm, for another year of hard work and learning.

Secondly, to our amazing staff team. Thank you to all of you for all that you do - much of it above and beyond. I hope that you all have a very refreshing and restorative holiday and I very much look forward to continuing to working with you in the Autumn. To those of you who are leaving us, thank you for all of the hard work you have put in to make St. Mary's what it is to-day. We wish you all the very best for the future and we look forward to meeting and working with new colleagues as our team continues to go from strength to strength.

To all of you, I wish you a very restful but fun summer break and I look forward to seeing you all for another year of hard work and fun from September 6th!



CLASSROOM CLOSE-UPS

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Wow! Year 3 have had an amazing summer term! The excitement began with our weekly swimming lessons at Putney Leisure Centre - everyone in the class hás developed their abilities and water confidence - we are so proud of



so proud of every single child!
In our English lessons, the class enjoyed reading 'Journey' and 'Giraffa Ziraffa'. These charming stories enabled the children to write letters, diary entries, descriptions and persuasions. The class worked hard on developing their writing. In maths the children tackled fractions, a challenging topic for them, but they have all showed resilience and have gained new knowledge. Y4

Our Year 4's have kept very busy with fantastic trips and opportunities; taking their learning experiences outside the classroom to enhance their educational outcomes! They applied their knowledge of sound in their science unit; how sound is created, manipulated and transferred to the receiver. They were quite amazed!

The class have also been working extremely hard in the lead up to their flute concert; they performed for their teachers and families with enthusiasm and did incredibly well – they

In English this term, the children were introduced to our new fictional text, Blue John; unpacking the mystical story set in the Castleton Caverns in the Peak District. Our work explored formations of caves and minerals. Year 4 wrote a letter in role as an expert which included an explanation

Our Design and Technolgy lessons have been based around cooking; Year 4 have been getting creative in the kitchen, making their very own biscuits. Year 4 have shown great enthusiasm and effort during this unit, and most importantly the biscuits were delicious!

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Year 6 has had a fantastic last term at St Mary's, it is hard to believe that our time here is over. Although we took the KS2 SATs this term, they seem like a distant memory. We definitely worked hard to get ready for them, the tests were challenging but the week was also full of fun. Miss McEvoy even learnt some new facts and names! We took part in a workshop at the Natural History Museum where we learnt all about Sophie the

Our learning was based around the story, The Sea Saw by Tom Percival which is about a child who loses her precious teddy. We discussed what was precious to us and thought about our feelings if we were the child in the story. The children wrote invitations to their teddies to invite them in for a picnic. The children made fruit kebabs for the picnic practising their fine motor skills. Reception enjoyed lots of activities in the Summer Term. Some of our favourites, the Coronation Celebration, visiting LEGOLAND and Sport's Day. This year has flown by. Well done to everyone for their fantastic learning and progress this year. SCIENCE

This year the teaching staff have been looking at ways of enhancing our science provision. We have worked with STEM Learning (leading education experts in the subjects of science, technology, engineering and maths) to participate in science training and development. This began with an audit of our current science provision and deciding on the actions needed that will improve and enhance the teaching and learning of science across the school.

Some of the actions included reviewing the teaching sequence and plans for the different science topics, making use of knowledge matrices for each topic, breaking down lessons into smaller steps and linking to prior learning, understanding the scientific enquiry types and applying the different science skills in practical work.

Teachers have now completed training so that they can implement these actions into their science lessons. In addition, each classroom now has a science 'working wall' display and the children have taken part in enrichment activities with class trips to the Holly Lodge Outdoor Learning Centre in Richmond Park. It has been wonderful to see the progress made so far and the work will continue into the next academic year to ensure that our science teaching and learning continues to develop.

SPORT & PE





At the end of the last school year, we surveyed children in key stages one and two on their attitudes to bullying. 
