SAFER INTERNET DAY

On Tuesday 6th February the school joined the world by marking Safer Internet Day - an annual event that focuses on online safety. This year's theme was 'Inspiring change? Making a difference, managing influence and navigating change online'. A Safer Internet Day assembly took place that asked the children across Y1-Y6 to think about their perspective on new and emerging technologies and using the Internet to make change for the better.

Staying up to date with what children are doing online can feel like a challenge sometimes. However, you don't have to be an expert in every new app or service. Simply having conversations with your children about their lives online, and what to do if they need help or something goes wrong, is what's most important. Here are a few simple steps you can take to help promote a safe, responsible and positive use of digital technology:

- Talk little and often

Having a regular open dialogue with your children about their favourite apps, the games they enjoy, and their online friends, will help create an environment where chatting about online experiences becomes a normal part of family life. - Stay proactive

As a result of discussions with your children about their online activities, take time to research the apps they're using, the accounts or channels they're following, and the games they're playing, to get a better idea of what they're experiencing and what your thoughts are towards it.

- Seek support

Knowing where to get help is essential. Each app or platform will have its own safety guidelines and reporting features, and having knowledge of how to use these will ensure you can make a report, seek help, and support your child to get the best out of the services they're using.

Y3

Highlights for Year 3 this Spring Term have included their visits to St. Mary's Church for their rousing performance of L-O-V-E for the Mother's Day service and more recently for Godly



Play where they explored the Parable of the Good Shepherd. School trips to the British Museum and the Natural History Museum offered the children excellent opportunities to find out more about their history topic of the Ancient Egyptians and their geography study on earthquakes and volcanoes. The children have continued to enjoy learning to play the recorder and performed brilliantly in the last WCET concert. RE lessons this term explored Jesus through his 'I am' statements and the Beatitudes. In maths the children have worked on multiplication and division, money, statistics and measuring length. In English they wrote their own exciting adventure stories based on the book 'Stone Age Boy' by Satoshi Kitamura. Probably the most exciting event has been the start of swimming lessons at Putney Leisure Centre - the children have taken to these well and have all shown great progress in the pool - well done everyone!

Y1

Year 1 have absolutely loved taking part in various events and celebrations over the term! We took part in our Cycle Everest Challenge and enjoyed cycling our part and cheering each other on. We also enjoyed writing our own stories for World Book Day and showing off our outfits as we dressed as ourselves for Comic Relief. Our favourite event, however, was definitely celebrating Mothering Sunday. We practised following a recipe to



bake biscuits for our grown-ups as well as designing our own special Mother's Day boxes to put them in!

In English, we have been on an amazing adventure chasing the naughty baby mammoth, Teddy, on his trail of "mischief and mayhem" through the museum! We enjoyed writing our own stories based on 'The Curious Case of the Missing Mammoth' and had so much fun thinking about rooms that we might run through. In Science the children have been learning all about Earth and Space. This topic has really inspired the children and they have been coming up with some excellent questions. For example, 'if we lived on the moon, would a Year be 27 days?' Rayan, 'What might happen in the moon stopped rotating?' Andrea and 'What does The sun look like from The Moon?' Teo.

Year 5 have had another fantastic term so far and we cannot wait for the many more exciting things to come.

The Spring Term has been very busy in Nursery! We welcomed several new children this term and they have all settled in brilliantly to St. Mary's! After Christmas, we learnt about traditional tales. Y4

Spring Term has been an adventure, as we dived into our topic of rainforests in geography! We made our way to Kew Gardens at the beginning of the term, where we learned about the four different layers of the rainforest and discovered a variety of biomes and habitats within the large glasshouses at Kew.

In mathematics, we have been working extremely hard to finish our multiplication and division unit. We have now begun an area unit and will begin to introduce fractions and decimals. We have already discovered that fractions and decimals are all around us!

Throughout our English lessons, students have been deconstructing a picture-book text called "When the Giant Stirred", where students have placed themselves in the perspective of a villager, learning to empathise with the characters and events that occur throughout the story. Children then created their own narrative that fulfils the storyline of the text, from the perspective of the young boy. Finally, we have been investigating our new topic of sound in science, where we have learned to understand that sound is made through vibrations. Children will get to make their own musical instrument to create sound vibrations and understand how sound waves travel to the ears.

Year 2 have had a fantastic term full of fun and learning. We have enjoyed discovering information about women who changed the world in history. We explored the unfairness of history by partaking in a race where some of the children started at different positions. We explored the many accounts of people within history who lived under unfair and disadvantaged conditions yet made a huge impact.We have also loved our class text 'Major Glad, Major Dizzy' and thinking about the passing of time through the eyes of a toy soldier. A particular highlight has been bringing in our own favourite toys to discuss with the class and following instructions to make our own peg soldiers! Other highlights of the term include Red Nose Day, practising our song for Mother's Day, making our Mother's Day gifts in DT and the Anti-Bullying Day workshop. Year 2 were extremely lucky to be given the exciting opportunity to visit Waterstones Putney. They enjoyed listening to a story, asking, and answering questions. We couldn't keep our noses out of the books we received, on our return journey to school!

This term, Year 6 have had a wonderful time. We have done many activities both in and out of school. Our classmates did a netball tournament and competed at Sportshall Athletics. The children were given the wonderful opportunity of speaking with members of the environmental team and discussed how buildings are made to be more sustainable. The children formed part of the board and discussed sustainability in school and then had a marvellous time looking at different sustainable textiles and how buildings are planned



for using scaled down 3D models. The talented creators and architects showed the children how the 3D printers work and demonstrated how every aspect of a building is thought through before it is built. This was a wonderful opportunity for the children (and staff) to see this type of work in action and we thank Rana Imad for organising such a unique and hugely informative trip for the children.

During the Spring Term, Year Five and Year Six have been practicing a variety of athletics activities in preparation for the SportsHall Athletics event at Tooting Leisure Centre. Playground Project Update

Our ambitious goal remains to continue the transformation of the school playground by completing Phase 2 of the work this summer – including installing an eco-classroom and an amazing outdoor learning space which will benefit all pupils at St Mary's. We still need to raise further funds to make this a reality, but it has been amazing to see the fundraising momentum holding strong this term and our current totaliser stands at an incredible £68,535!

Alongside the fundraising efforts, a lot of work has been taking place in the background to review and finalise the design for Phase 2 ahead of going out to tender and hopefully scheduling the work to take place this summer if sufficient funding is in place. A big thank you to Rana Mezher Imad who has been providing fantastic advice on the design side of things, and working closely with the school senior leadership team to seek to reduce costs where possible and maximise the benefits of this phase of the project for the pupils.

Every single contribution - whether financial or volunteering time - really does make a difference, and we are so grateful for the incredible support from the whole school community. We are getting so close now - let's make this happen!

FoSMS funding making a difference

With so much focus on the Playground Project in recent years it's sometimes easy to forget that FoSMS funding is also relied upon to enhance the education and opportunities available to St Mary's pupils throughout the year. Particular highlights this term have been the weekly swimming lessons for Y3 and of course the Easter treats for all the children at the end of term! We are also looking ahead to Sports Day planning for next term and have been liaising with the school senior leadership team to explore how FoSMS funding can be used most effectively.

It was an incredible event and the buzz was extraordinary as the children cheered each other on, parents joined in over lunchtime, and Mr. Lett and Reverend John got us over the line at the end of the day. It also proved to be a record-breaking event in terms of sponsorship raised, with the final total coming in at £18,000 - wow! This included a very generous donation of £5,000 from Mapei, in response to a brilliant letter sent by Y5 pupils and Mrs Adams sharing their artwork featuring Mapei-sponsored cycling kit and seeking help with the playground project.
